During the past year active research has been carried on in the Departments of Botany, Zoology as well as Archaeology, and expeditions into Northern India and Tibet have brought back rare collections. Some of these have already been forwarded to scientific institutions in this country as well as abroad. The presence of unusual medicinal herbs as well as the valuable treatises of the Tibetan pharmacology, which since times immemorial has had in its possession successful remedies against cancer, tuberculosis and other malignant diseases, have led the Institute to develop intensive research, also, in Bio-chemistry, Cancer and Pharmacology. Bio-chemical laboratories are now being constructed for further research work.

The Institute includes among its Honorary Advisers, Dr. Albert Einstein, Professor Robert A. Millikan, Dr. R.V.D. Magoffin, Dr. Edgar L. Hewett, Sir Jagadis Bose, Professor Jacques Bacot, and others.
